# **SUNDAY, AUGUST 1, 2021**

(Lec. 113)

 $18^{\mathrm{TH}}$  SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

- 1) Exodus 16:2-4, 12-15
- 2) Ephesians 4:17, 20-24
- 3) John 6:24-35

FOCUS: Do not work for food that perishes, but for the food that endures for eternal life.

As we listen to the Discourse on the Bread of Life, we are reminded that on the journey of life, no matter its twists and turns, the Lord continues to travel with us and to care for us, nourishing us with heavenly food as he once fed the Israelites in the desert.

## **LITURGY OF THE WORD**

As the Israelites wander through the desert, the Lord hears their cry and feeds them with bread from heaven. Saint Paul challenges the Ephesians to walk in the way of *righteousness and holiness of truth* so that their lives are different from nonbelievers. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the people not to work for food that perishes, saying, *I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst*.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: As God's holy people, we acknowledge his kindness and faithfulness throughout the generations as we bring our needs before him.

- 1) For the Church, may the gift of the Eucharist nourish our souls and help us work together to seek the fulfillment of the reign of God, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all who exercise authority, may the Holy Spirit guide them in right judgment, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For refugees who have fled their homelands for safety, may God grant them relief through the kindness of his people, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For the elders of our community, especially those who are isolated, may the Lord grant them perseverance in faith and hope, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died, may they be welcomed to the eternal banquet in heaven, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Good and gracious God, listen to the prayers of your people. If it is your will, grant what we have asked. We make this prayer through Christ our Lord.

Monday, August 2, 2021 (Lec. 407) 1) Numbers 11:4b-15

Matthew 14:13-21

MONDAY OF 18<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. Saint Eusebius of Vercelli, Bishop; Saint Peter Julian Eymard, Priest)

FOCUS: God satisfies our every hunger.

Today's readings reveal God's great love for us through the power of miracles. In our hunger, God does not abandon us, but rather provides for us. In faith, we trust that God is with us. Through him, we are nourished and fed.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, the Israelites lament, recalling their previous life and the food they regularly ate, even though God has provided them manna. In the Gospel, Jesus miraculously feeds the crowd of five thousand from just five loaves and two fish. The entire crowd eats, and there are still leftovers.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Knowing that God provides for our every need, we bring our prayers together with one voice.

- 1) For the Church in its ministry to those who hunger, may God continue to pour out his abundant grace, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For peace in the world, and for the salvation of souls, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who are hungry or face food insecurity, may the Lord meet their needs and bring us to respond with compassion, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all of us gathered here, may God help us encourage one another in faith through our prayers and presence, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died, may God's light lead them to his everlasting kingdom, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: God of abundance, you have provided for our every need throughout salvation history. Listen to our longings today, we ask this through Christ our Lord.

Tuesday, August 3, 2021 (Lec. 408)

TUESDAY OF 18<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME

- 1) Numbers 12:1-13
- 2) Matthew 14:22-36 or Matthew 15:1-2, 10-14

FOCUS: We fix our eyes on Jesus, the guiding star amid the storm.

Doubt is part of the human condition. Our vision often is blurry; we do not see God as we ought. Nevertheless, Jesus reaches out to us, as he did to rescue Peter from the stormy water. Jesus never ceases to be our guiding star if we have the courage to weather the storm and fix our eyes on him alone.

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Miriam and Aaron complain and speak against Moses, which angers the Lord. He turns Miriam into a leper, but Moses pleads on her behalf. In the Gospel, Jesus comes to meet the disciples in their boat by *walking on the sea*. They are afraid, but he tells them to *take courage*. Peter attempts to walk on the water, but begins to sink out of fear. Those in the boat say, *Truly, you are the Son of God*.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With God as our loving Father, let us bring our prayers before him.

- 1) For all those in leadership in the Church, may they be guided by the Holy Spirit in their efforts to share the Gospel message, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For local, state, and national leaders, may they protect the dignity of life at all stages when making laws and policies, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those experiencing doubt, may Jesus reveal himself and assure them of his abiding love and presence, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For the members of this faith community, may the light of Christ shine upon us and those we encounter, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died marked by the sign of faith, may God grant them pardon and eternal peace, let us pray to the Lord.

Wednesday, August 4, 2021 (Lec. 409)

WEDNESDAY OF 18<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TME (OBL MEM Saint John Vianney, Priest)

FOCUS: Finding our strength in faith.

Our Liturgy of the Word today explores what it means to have faith, revealing a marked contrast between the feeble faith of the Israelites in the first reading and the tremendous faith of the Canaanite woman in the Gospel. Both readings demonstrate the impact our faith can have on our lives.

## **LITURGY OF THE WORD**

In the first reading, the Israelites are greatly worried after seeing the strength of the people occupying the land of Canaan, and they grumble against the Lord. The Lord rebukes them and gives them 40 more years in the desert. In the Gospel, Jesus encounters a Canaanite woman who asks him for help. Because of her faith, her daughter is healed.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: In faith, let us bring our prayers together before the Lord.

- 1) For Pope Francis and all his brother bishops around the world, may the Lord bless and protect them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For police, firefighters, first responders, and others who keep our communities safe, may the Lord protect and guide them in all they do, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all who care for the sick or infirm, may the Lord give them strength in their daily work, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For those of us gathered here, may the Lord increase our faith and help us when we falter, let us pray to the Lord.

THURSDAY OF 18<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. The Dedication of the Basilica of Saint Mary Major)

FOCUS: Let us take the time to see God's glory prominent in our own lives.

Each of today's readings have a story reflecting God's glory: from a rock comes living water; upon the rock of Peter will be the living water of the Church. One way we can grow in faith is to take the time to see God's glory prominent in our own lives. That we live, and breathe, and have being at all is due to the Lord. Yet there are other "rocks" in our foundation that show the Lord's marvelous works. As we reflect on these and express our gratitude, we can grow closer to God.

# LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, the community grumbles against Moses and the Lord, concerned over their struggles and lack of water. The Lord instructs Moses to bring forth water from a rock. In the Gospel, Peter declares Jesus to be *the Christ, the Son of the living God*. Jesus commends Peter and says that the Church will be built upon him. But soon after, Jesus rebukes Peter for his refusal to accept what must happen to Jesus.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Longing for peace, we bring our concerns before God together with one voice.

- 1) For the holy Church and its mission to build God's kingdom on earth, may Christ's glory shine in her, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all of those who hold elected office, may they be led by the Gospel in their development of policies, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all of those who hunger or thirst, may God satisfy their every need, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all of us called to witness to Christ's glory, may God increase our understanding to do his will, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died, may they soon find their place at the table of Christ's heavenly feast, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: God our Father, you sent your only Son to bring us redemption. Hear our prayers that we place before you today, we ask through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Friday, August 6, 2021 (Lec. 614)

THE TRANSFIGURATION
OF THE LORD
- FEAST

- 1) Daniel 7:9-10, 13-14
- 2) 2 Peter 1:16-19
- 3) Mark 9:2-10

FOCUS: The glory of our Lord Jesus Christ is real.

On this feast of the Transfiguration, we celebrate that "Christ, Head of the Church, manifests what his Body contains and radiates in the sacraments: 'the hope of glory' (CCC 568). The vision in Daniel of the Son of Man receiving dominion and kingship prefigures the Transfiguration: a moment when Christ is revealed as God's word fulfilled, and whose glorious appearance gives us hope for our own resurrection into eternal life.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, the author speaks of a vision, where the Ancient One took his throne. He was ministered to by multitudes of thousands, and one like a Son of Man came to him and received dominion, glory, and kingship. In the second reading, Peter recounts witnessing Jesus' majesty and hearing God's voice declare Jesus as his Son with whom he is well pleased. In the Gospel, Jesus is transfigured before Peter, James, and John, while Elijah and Moses appear to them. Peter wishes to make tents for Jesus, Moses, and Elijah, but Jesus instructs them to tell no one of what they had seen.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: As we celebrate our one true Savior, we bring our needs to our merciful Father.

- 1) For the pope and all those who shepherd the body of Christ, may the Lord bless and strengthen them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all public servants, may the Holy Spirit inspire them to protect and defend the dignity and sanctity of human life, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who struggle with depression or abandonment, may they know God's constant presence, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For the young people in this faith community, may the Holy Spirit fill them with a zeal for the Gospel, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For those who have died, may they soon find eternal peace in the glory of God's presence, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Heavenly Father, we ask you to hear and answer our prayers according to your will, through your Son, Jesus Christ.

Saturday, August 7, 2021 (Lec. 412)

- 1) Deuteronomy 6:4-13
- 2) Matthew 17:14-20

SATURDAY OF 18<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. Saint Sixtus II, Pope, and Companions, Martyrs; Saint Cajetan, Priest; Saturday in honor of BVM)

FOCUS: Love, serve, and trust in God no matter what is happening in your life.

Today's readings caution against forgetting God when things are going well (thus forgetting to thank God for his gifts) or losing faith when faced with difficulty or illness, like the disciples who were unable to drive out the demon. Moses reminds us we must love God completely at all times and teach others to do likewise.

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

Moses commands the Israelites to love God with all their heart, soul, and strength. He also reminds them not to forget the Lord who brought them out of Egypt and slavery. Jesus heals a boy whom the disciples could not heal. Jesus tells them it is because of their *little faith*.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Trusting in the same Jesus who healed the sick, we bring our prayers to our heavenly Father.

- 1) For the Church, as the Mystical Body of Christ, may she grow and prosper in the Lord's saving work, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all in leadership positions, may the Lord guide them in using their talents for the good of all they serve, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For victims and survivors of human trafficking, may they find hope in God's love and care for them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For our faith community, may the Holy Spirit continue to increase our love for the Father, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For our beloved dead, may the Lord welcome them into his heavenly kingdom, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Heavenly Father, we praise you for your goodness. Look with favor on the petitions we bring you today, which we ask in the name of Jesus, your Son.

# SUNDAY, AUGUST 8, 2021

(Lec. 116)

19<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

- 1) 1 Kings 19:4-8
- 2) Ephesians 4:30–5:2
- 3) John 6:41-51

FOCUS: God gives us bread to inspire and sustain us.

Today's readings give much encouragement for those times when we feel like giving up on ourselves or on God. Whether our murmuring is negative self-talk or sarcastic memes on social media, consider taking a break from negativity. Get up, take and eat the bread of life, and live in Christ's love.

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Elijah prays for death. But an *angel of the Lord* tells him to *get up and eat*. Elijah does, then walks for 40 days and nights to Mount Horeb. Saint Paul urges the Ephesians to *be imitators of God*. In the Gospel, Jesus declares that he is the bread of life which he will give *for the life of the world*.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Taking comfort in God's bountiful provisions, let us bring our prayers to the Lord.

- 1) For all baptized in the Church, may the Holy Spirit aid us in our imitation of Christ's sacrificial love and forgiveness, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all who are serving in government and civic leadership, may the Lord give them hearts of compassion and wisdom, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those overwhelmed by life's circumstances and difficulties, may the peace of Christ bring them relief and consolation, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For each of us here, may the Lord help us grow in compassion toward one another, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For those who have died, may they soon bask in the eternal light of the Lord, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Almighty Father, listen to our prayers and grant all that is good. We ask this through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Monday, August 9, 2021 (Lec. 413) 1) Deuteronomy 10:12-22

Matthew 17:22-27

MONDAY OF 19<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. Saint Teresa Benedicta of the Cross, Virgin and Martyr)

FOCUS: The law of the Lord is justice and love.

Today's reading from Deuteronomy presents an understanding of God's law as an expression of reciprocal love. God provides the law for our own well-being, and we show our love for God by following his commandments and serving our neighbors.

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

Moses summarizes what the Lord asks of his people: to love and serve the Lord with their whole being and to keep the commandments. They are also to imitate God's love for orphans, widows, and aliens. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that the Son of Man will be killed and then raised on the third day. Then Jesus and Peter discuss the obligation to pay the temple tax.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Remembering all that the Lord has done for us, we now bring our petitions to him.

- 1) That Christian missionaries may be kept safe, and that their work may always reflect the goodness of God, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) That leaders throughout the world may be blessed with the integrity and strength necessary to seek justice for all their people, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) That our care for today's orphans, widows, and aliens may imitate God's love for them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) That we who are gathered here may experience conversion of heart to love and serve the Lord with our whole being, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) That all who have died may be welcomed into the heavenly kingdom to dwell forever in God's presence, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Loving God, we entrust our prayers to you in the hope that what we have asked in faith we may obtain, through Christ our Lord.

Tuesday, August 10, 2021 (Lec. 618)

SAINT LAWRENCE, DEACON AND MARTYR - FEAST

- 1) 2 Corinthians 9:6-10
- 2) John 12:24-26

FOCUS: God honors those who serve him.

Sow bountifully ... reap bountifully. God, the giver of all good gifts, has given us everything; what we give him in return he will multiply for the sake of the world. As with a grain of wheat, the Lord will bring forth great fruit from our dying to self and serving him.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

Saint Paul exhorts the Corinthian community to cheerful generosity in response to the abundant generosity of God. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples that unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it cannot produce fruit.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With trust in our loving God, let us bring him our prayers.

- 1) For Pope Francis and Church leaders, may the Lord give them holy vision and courage in ministry, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all legal professionals, attorneys, and judges, may God bless their efforts to seek truth and justice, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who suffer from addiction, may the Holy Spirit give them strength in finding peace in their lives and help for their pain, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all of us gathered here, may God give us the grace to become cheerful givers to our Church and to those in need, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For our beloved dead, may God grant them eternal rest, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Lord, your grace and mercy are all we need, yet you lovingly receive our requests. Hear these petitions and answer them according to your holy will. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

WEDNESDAY OF 19<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (OBL MEM Saint Clare, Virgin)

<u>FOCUS</u>: Jesus tells us that when we are gathered together in his name, he is in our midst.

Jesus assures us that he is with us when we come together in worship and prayer. In building a community in his name, with Jesus among us, there is no end to what we can accomplish. We are called to offer forgiveness to those who have hurt us, and to invite others to join us on our mission.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Moses' mission to lead the children of Israel to the Promised Land is complete, but he will not be allowed to enter and so he dies in the land of Moab. Joshua is now the leader of the Israelites. In the Gospel, Jesus instructs his disciples on how to deal with sins and faults between them, as whatever they bind and loose on earth shall also be done so in heaven. He assures them, where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: We know that God is with us as we gather in his name. And so we join together in prayer as we place our petitions before him.

- 1) For our Holy Father, bishops, and all who lead our communities of faith, may they be strengthened by God's love and mercy in their lives of service, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For politicians and government leaders throughout the world, may God's peace come upon them and the nations they lead, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who have been impacted by natural disaster, war, or extreme illness, may God bless them with strength and courage, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For those in our community who have experienced the loss of a loved one, may God's light show them the way through the darkness, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For our beloved dead, may God open his arms to them as they pass over into eternal life, let us pray to the Lord.

PRIEST: Heavenly Father, we ask that you look with favor on these petitions offered by this assembly gathered to honor you. We ask this through Jesus, your Son.

Thursday, August 12, 2021 (Lec. 416)
1) Joshua 3:7-10a, 11, 13-17

THURSDAY OF 19<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. Saint Jane Frances de Chantal, Religious)

2) Matthew 18:21–19:1

FOCUS: Forgive unceasingly, lest we be judged by our own measure of mercy.

How many of us have had experiences with others that have tried our patience? Or perhaps we ourselves hurt others with our words and actions? Jesus' command to forgive seventy-seven times is meant for every one of these situations. Each small, even internal gesture of patience and mercy could be the training we need to cultivate a divine magnanimity.

## **LITURGY OF THE WORD**

In the first reading, Joshua and the children of Israel finally enter into the Promised Land of Canaan. They do so by crossing the Jordan River, which has been miraculously dried up and halted by the presence of the Ark of the Covenant in its waters. In the Gospel, Jesus tells Peter that he must forgive *not seven times, but seventy-seven times,* then tells a parable about a master showing a servant mercy.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Standing firmly in the shelter of the Lord, let us present our needs to him this day.

- 1) For the Church throughout the world, may she grow in unity, mercy, and holiness, by God's power and grace, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For world leaders, may the Holy Spirit guide them in their creation of legislation protecting the unborn, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For those who are alone, may God's merciful love enfold and encourage them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For this faith community, may the Lord inspire us in the use of our time, talent, and treasure, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For those who have died, especially those who have no one to pray for them, may they rest in peace, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Loving God, hear our earnest prayers through your abundant mercy. We ask this through Christ our Lord.

FRIDAY OF 19<sup>TH</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (Opt. Mem. Saints Pontian, Pope, and Hippolytus, Priest, Martyrs)

<u>FOCUS</u>: The Lord is good and merciful, watching over his people, keeping them from the grasp of their enemies.

Today's Scriptures are a reminder of the watchful and protective nature of the Lord. Joshua offers a short history of the Lord's care of Israel, offering them their enemies and their lands. Jesus himself evades the snare of his enemies by deftly answering a question on marriage that the Pharisees use to test him.

# LITURGY OF THE WORD

Joshua gathers the people of Israel and recounts the deliverance of their enemies and their lands into their possession. In the Gospel, the Pharisees test Jesus by asking him, *Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife for any cause whatever?* 

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Let us now offer our prayers to the Lord, whose mercy endures forever.

- 1) For all members of the Church, may we be ever united in the mission of spreading the Gospel, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For diplomats, ambassadors, and other government officials who strive to bring about peace among nations, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For families who face the challenges of illness, addiction, or division, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all of us gathered here, may we have the grace to be faithful to Jesus' command to love one another, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For the faithful departed, may they joyfully claim their citizenship in heaven, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Good and gracious God, we give thanks to you, for your endless mercy. We ask that you listen to the prayers we offer to you, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Saturday, August 14, 2021 (Lec. 418)

1) Joshua 24:14-29

Matthew 19:13-15

SATURDAY OF 19<sup>th</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME (OBL MEM Saint Maximilian Kolbe, Priest and Martyr)

FOCUS: Children are models for Christian discipleship.

Today in Matthew's Gospel, Jesus holds children up as examples of citizens of the kingdom of heaven. One way young children differ from adults is their lack of preconceived notions. What faults in our ways of thinking keep us from experiencing and sharing the joy of heaven on earth?

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, as Joshua's final days approach, he gathers all of the tribes of Israel and renews the covenant with all who recommit to turn away from other idols and to serve the Lord. In the Gospel, Jesus dismisses the rebuke of those who brought children to him, saying, *let the children come to me, and do not prevent them*.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With the openness and humility of a child, let us offer our prayers to our heavenly Father, confident in his love for us.

- 1) For consecrated religious men and women, may the Spirit set their hearts ablaze as they continue to grow in holiness, let us pray to the Lord.

In the first reading, the Israelites turn again and again to false idols while God continues to send judges to restore his people. In the Gospel, the rich young man asks how to gain eternal life, but goes away sad when Jesus tells him to sell his many possessions and come, follow him.

PRIEST: Confident that our heavenly Father will hear our prayers, we bring him our petitions today.

In the Gospel, Jesus warns his disciples about how difficult it is for the rich to enter the kingdom of God, but also promises that for God all things are possible.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With confidence in the God through whom all things are possible, we offer these prayers today.

In the first reading, the citizens of Shechem and Beth-millo make Abimelech their king. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the generous landowner, who pays each a full day's wage despite the number of hours worked.

PRIEST: As we prepare to celebrate the Eucharist, let us first bring our needs and intentions to our loving Father.

- 1) For our Church, may God continue to call forth servant leaders who exemplify love, humility, and an unwavering commitment to the Gospel, let us pray to the Lord.

If nothing else, these two examples show us that God's desires for us are better than anything we can achieve on our own, and the wisdom to rely upon him and listen to him is a grace we need.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Jephthah makes a vow of a human sacrifice to gain a military victory. He ends up sacrificing his daughter. In the Gospel, Jesus tells a parable of a wedding feast, in which invitees ignore the king's invitation, even killing his servants. The king does away with them and invites others; one of them is expelled for not wearing a wedding garment.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Trusting in God's bountiful goodness, let us bring our petitions to him.

- 1) For the leaders of the Church, may the Holy Spirit grant them his gift of prudence to shepherd his flock well, let us pray to the Lord.

In the first reading, Ruth loses her husband, yet decides to go back to Judah with her mother-inlaw, Naomi, instead of returning to her native land of Moab. In the Gospel, Jesus tells a scholar of the law that the greatest commandments are to love the Lord with all your heart, soul, and mind; and to love your neighbor as yourself.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Let us turn now to the Lord with our petitions.

- 1) For the Church, may the Lord continue to bless her with fortitude in her protection of the unborn and the dignity of all human life, let us pray to the Lord.

Through her humble life, salvation history continues to unfold toward the birth of Jesus.

## **LITURGY OF THE WORD**

Ruth, a Moabite, gathers grain in the field of Boaz. Because of her good reputation, he invites her to join his household and eventually marries her. Their son, Obed, will be the grandfather of King David. In the Gospel, Jesus compares the example of the scribes and Pharisees with their teaching and says to follow their teaching, not their example.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Knowing that God provides for us as he did for Ruth, let us present our prayers of petition.

- 1) For Pope Francis, may the gifts of the Holy Spirit continue to inspire his ministry, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For government leaders, may their hearts be swayed by God's law to respect life and lead in truth and justice, let us pray to the Lord.
- For all who struggle to find meaning and direction in their lives, may Christ shine forth to light the path of hope in their search, let us pray to the Lord.

Are we able to take Peter's words as our own? *Master, to whom shall we go?* You have the words of eternal life. How well do we even know the words of Jesus? Let us recommit ourselves to deepening our knowledge and love of the Lord.

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Joshua and the tribes of Israel state their fidelity to the Lord God. In his Letter to the Ephesians, Saint Paul draws a parallel between a spousal relationship and the radical love between Christ and the Church. In the Gospel, Jesus proclaims that his words are *Spirit and life*, after which only some of his followers continued as disciples.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Secure in God's desire for our happiness and well-being, let us offer up our prayers for our neighbors, ourselves, and the world.

- 1) For priests and religious, may the Spirit shield them and strengthen them for the building of God's kingdom, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For an end to all war, and for those who work to secure peace among nations and people, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all who are suffering from illness, may Christ, the Divine Physician, bring them complete healing and comfort, let us pray to the Lord.

Saint Paul's encouragement to the Thessalonians is an encouragement to us, too. When we live genuine and authentic lives of faith, we become witnesses to the truth that Jesus is Lord. However, as Jesus warns in the Gospel, it is easy to become hypocritical. His words should remind us to take seriously our actions and choices, and to examine if we are living the truths that we proclaim. The Gospel is good news – let us live it in word and deed!

#### LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading. Paul greets his readers with peace and expresses his gratitude for their work and their faith in Jesus. He then shares with the Thessalonians the good fruit of their work – the faith of Christ spreading and others declaring Jesus as Lord. In the Gospel, Jesus offers stern warnings to scribes and Pharisees. He particularly warns against them being hypocrites.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Let us bring our prayers to God, seeking what we need to be faithful to his ways.

- 1) For the holy Catholic Church, may the Lord continue to bless her as a pure and faithful presence in the world, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For elected officials, may they be emboldened by God's divine providence in working for the good of all, let us pray to the Lord.

John receives a vision of *the holy city Jerusalem*. It was radiant, with a high wall and twelve gates, and twelve foundation stones. In the Gospel, Philip brings Nathanael to Jesus, who tells Nathanael he saw him under the fig tree. When Nathanael then declares Jesus to be the Son of God, Jesus predicts he will see greater things.

#### **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With humble confidence in our gracious God, let us turn to him in prayer.

- 1) For our bishops, may the Holy Spirit continue to guide them in lives of holy service and leadership, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For civic leaders, may they be blessed with the guidance of the Holy Spirit in making policies supporting the dignity and sanctity of life, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For the sick and suffering, may the Lord bring them healing of body and spirit, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For each of us, may the Holy Spirit conform our hearts and minds ever more to Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

In the first reading, Paul reminds the Thessalonians of his hard labor and blameless behavior as he preached to them the word of God, now at work within them. In the Gospel, Jesus issues "Woe to you" indictments against the scribes and Pharisees, this time for their hypocrisy.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: With humble hearts, we bring our prayers and petitions to the Father.

- 1) That the Church throughout the world may be blessed with a spirit of humility before the Lord, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) That world leaders may be granted wisdom and courage by the Holy Spirit as they formulate laws and policies, let us pray to the Lord.

In the first reading, Saint Paul writes to the Thessalonian community of his support for them as they seek to increase their faith. He encourages them to strengthen their hearts. In the Gospel, Jesus urges readiness before the coming of the Lord. He emphasizes this with the parable of the faithful and unfaithful servants.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Mindful of the need for God in our lives, let us together bring our prayers before him.

- 1) For the Church in her work to build the kingdom of God on earth, may God guide her in this holy call, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all who are in leadership in our communities, may God give them courage in their professions, let us pray to the Lord.

Paul exhorts the Thessalonians to increase their efforts to conduct themselves in a manner that is pleasing to God, which is avoiding immorality and pursuing holiness. In the Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples a parable about ten virgins waiting for the bridegroom and advises them to stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: Trusting in the Lord's goodness, let us bring before him our prayers and petitions.

- 1) For seminarians throughout the world, may the Holy Spirit continue to guide their discernment and sustain them in their formation, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all civic leaders, may the Lord bless them with a hunger for justice and truth, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For compassionate caregivers, may the Lord strengthen and encourage them, let us pray to the Lord.

Saint Augustine is best known for the story of his conversion to Christianity. As a young man he tasted all the fruits of this life and yet was never satisfied. In his yearning for truth, he first encountered Christ through the words of Scripture and then, in a more personal and life-changing manner, in his own prayer. Noted for his wisdom and learning, Augustine bears witness to the truth of Paul's words that in Christ, we have been taught to love one another.

# LITURGY OF THE WORD

Saint Paul writes to the Thessalonians about the need for fraternal charity, tranquil living, and hard work within the community. In the Gospel, Jesus tells the parable of the talents to teach the lesson that to those who are faithful in small matters, greater responsibilities will be entrusted.

# **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: With confidence and trust in God's mercy and providence, we bring our prayers and petitions before him.

- 1) For an increase in vocations to the priesthood and religious life, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For governments and world leaders, may the Gospel message of hope and justice inform and direct their decisions and actions, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For peace and justice in our homes and communities, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For this faith community, may the grace of this sacrament transform us as witnesses of Christ's love and mercy, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died marked with the sign of faith, may they rest in the eternal peace of Christ, let us pray to the Lord.

PRIEST: Almighty and living God, you alone can change hearts and fill us with hope and lasting joy. We ask you to hear our prayers and answer them through Christ our Lord.

# SUNDAY, AUGUST 29, 2021

(Lec. 125)

22<sup>ND</sup> SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

- 1) Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-8
- 2) James 1:17-18, 21b-22, 27
- 3) Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

FOCUS: Be doers of the word and not hearers only.

We are called to be doers of the word, not hearers only. The statutes of God are provided for our benefit; they guide us in the ways of living with and loving one another. All good giving and every perfect gift is from above, and pure-hearted persons return that love in caring for the weakest and most vulnerable among them.

## LITURGY OF THE WORD

In the first reading, Moses proclaims the statutes of the Lord to the people, that they may have both life and land. In the second reading, James instructs believers to be *doers of the word*, caring for orphans and widows, and keeping *oneself unstained by the world*. In the Gospel, Jesus confronts the Pharisees and scribes with their hypocrisy, noting that what makes a person unclean comes from within, not from without.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: As children of God, we bring our cares to our loving Father.

- 1) For Pope Francis, bishops, and all spiritual leaders, may God give them a Spirit of wisdom in their decisions and actions, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For the salvation of the world, may the Lord grant mercy to all who have turned away from him and bring them out of darkness into light, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all who are struggling with poor health, mental anguish, or addiction, and for those who care for them, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For this faith community, may the Lord help us to embrace those things that endure forever, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have died, may they experience fullness of joy with God and the saints in heaven, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Father, we entrust our prayers to you in the holy name of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

- 1) 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18
- 2) Luke 4:16-30

FOCUS: Eternal life through Jesus is offered to everyone.

Not all of the Thessalonians were Israelites, and yet since Christ came for all, Paul preached the Gospel to all. The Lord was revealed to this community through Paul, just as he chose to reveal himself to the widow in Zarephath and Naaman the Syrian, through his prophets. Saint Paul's words, that those who believe in Jesus will rise again, are not just to the Thessalonians, but to all of us.

# LITURGY OF THE WORD

Saint Paul tells the Thessalonians to have hope that the faithful who have already died will rise again in Christ. In the Gospel, Jesus reads a scroll from the prophet Isaiah at the Nazareth synagogue, saying it is fulfilled. Others were amazed, but then Jesus points out that earlier prophets were sent to non-Israelites. Angered, they attempt to kill him but he escapes.

#### UNIVERSAL PRAYER

PRIEST: With confidence in God's goodness, let us turn to him with our needs.

- 1) For all who are discerning a call to a religious vocation, may the Holy Spirit give them the courage and grace to respond generously, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For policymakers, may the Lord of life inspire in them a desire to protect life in all stages, from conception to natural death, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all who grieve, may the hope of life in Christ bring them comfort and consolation, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For this faith community, may Christ lead us to an ever-deepening love for one another, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For the departed faithful, may they soon be in the presence of God with full joy and peace, let us pray to the Lord.
- 6) (Special petition/s)

PRIEST: Eternal Father, look with favor we pray upon the petitions we bring you in the name of your Son, who is Christ the Lord.

TUESDAY OF 22<sup>ND</sup> WEEK IN ORDINARY TIME

- 1) 1 Thessalonians 5:1-6, 9-11
- 2) Luke 4:31-37

FOCUS: For all of you are children of the light.

Today's readings shine a light on the witness of Christ. As disciples, we have witnessed his power and authority. His teachings and his miracles have transformed us. To be a disciple is to live what we have witnessed. We are called to be vigilant in our life of discipleship and to encourage each other on our respective journeys.

## **LITURGY OF THE WORD**

In the first reading, Paul writes to the Thessalonians that they are not in darkness, but are children of the light and children of the day. Therefore, they must be vigilant and work to encourage each other. In the Gospel, Jesus heals a man of a demon in Capernaum. The crowd that witnesses it is amazed at his authority and power, and word of him spreads.

## **UNIVERSAL PRAYER**

PRIEST: Confident in God's loving mercy, we bring our prayers before him.

- 1) For our Church, may the Holy Spirit guide each of us in living Jesus' message of love and forgiveness, let us pray to the Lord.
- 2) For all who hold political office, may God strengthen their commitment to those whom they serve, let us pray to the Lord.
- 3) For all who struggle with illness or suffering, may God's compassion bring them peace, let us pray to the Lord.
- 4) For all of us gathered here today, may the Holy Spirit empower us to bear good fruit for the glory of God, let us pray to the Lord.
- 5) For all who have entered eternal rest, may God's light shine upon them, let us pray to the Lord.
